Lenten Worship at St. Mary's

Today's liturgy takes place in the Christian season known as Lent, a forty-day period of penitence and fasting in preparation for Easter. Lent is a time of simplicity and spiritual refocusing. Christians observe Lent "by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial, and by reading and meditating on God's holy word" (Book of Common Prayer). Sunday worship during the season of Lent reflects the penitential nature and simplicity of the season. The saying of the Confession of Sin at the beginning of the service, the refraining from saying "Alleluia" until Easter, and the prayers and music chosen during this time are all ways that Lent is observed in church during these forty days as we get ready for the joyful Easter feast ahead.

We also offer special Lenten gatherings for learning and fellowship. Join us on Wednesdays in Lent at 6:30 P.M. for a Soup Supper and book discussion of *Tarry Awhile: Wisdom from Black Spirituality for People of Faith*, by Selina Stone. The Opening Acclamation

Presider: Blessed be the God of our salvation:

Assembly: Who bears our burdens and forgives our sins.

Presider: Since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

The Confession of Sin

Deacon or Presider: Let us confess our sins to God.

A period of silence is kept.

Deacon: God of all mercy,

Assembly: we confess that we have sinned against you,

opposing your will in our lives.

We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created.

We repent of the evil that enslaves us,

the evil we have done,

and the evil done on our behalf.

Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ,

that we may abide in your love

and serve only your will. Amen.

Presider: Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**

The Collect of the Day

Presider: The Lord be with you. Assembly: And also with you.

Presider: Let us pray.

A moment of silent prayer is observed.

Presider: Almighty God, you alone can bring into order the unruly wills and affections of sinners: Grant your people grace to love what you command and desire what you promise; that, among the swift and varied changes of the world, our hearts may surely there be fixed where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Tone: VI

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. My delight is in your statutes; * I will not forget your word.

The Second Reading

Hebrews 5:5-10

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place, "You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek." In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. Assembly: **Thanks be to God.**

The Gospel

All standing, the Deacon or a Priest reads the Gospel

John 12:20-33

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

Assembly: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour?' No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

Deacon: The Gospel of the Lord.

Assembly: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

The Nicene Creed

All stand, as able

Enriching our Worship

Presider: We believe in one God,

Assembly: the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth,

of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation

he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and became truly human.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father,*
who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Prayers of the People

The Deacon or appointed intercessor leads us in the Prayers of the People

In the silences after each bidding, the people may offer their own prayers, either silently or aloud.

Intercessor: Eternal and loving God, lift us to your presence, as we bring before you our concerns for the Church and the world.

Brief silence

Intercessor: Blessed Father, your Son gave himself to be lifted up in order to draw us to him. Help us, your Church, through our witness, and through the offering of our lives and gifts to our neighbors, to bring others into your loving embrace. Call us all, clergy and people, into deeper discipleship. Strengthen us for these remaining days of Lent, and make us ready as we prepare to celebrate Christ's glorification in these holy days to come.

Silence

Intercessor: Almighty One, you have driven out the ruler of this world through the glorification of Jesus. Write your law of love on the hearts of all who hold authority among the nations, that the broken body of the world may be healed. Bring the power of your saving help to the Holy Land, to Ukraine, to Haiti, and to all who suffer because of war, conflict, or hunger, that they may once again know joy and gladness.

Silence

Intercessor: We thank you, gracious God, for the incarnation of your Son Jesus, who shares our joys and sorrows. Hear our prayers for the sick, the sorrowful, the anxious, and all who wait in pain or uncertainty. Help us to speak comfort to those who suffer and to offer consolation to those who grieve.

Silence

Intercessor: Your Son Jesus taught that when a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it bears much fruit. We entrust to your loving care all of those who have surrendered their lives into your eternal keeping. Hear our prayers for all who have died.

Silence

Intercessor: Let these and any prayers and concerns we lift up to you at this time ascend and be received by you, God of endless mercy, through Jesus, our eternal high priest.

Other intercessions and thanksgivings may be offered.

The Presider concludes with a Collect.

Presider: Almighty and eternal God, so draw our hearts to you, so guide our minds, so fill our imaginations, so control our wills, that we may be wholly yours, utterly dedicated to you; and then use us, we pray you, as you will, and always to your glory and the welfare of your people, through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

Presider: On the night he was betrayed Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke the bread, and gave it to his friends, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine, gave thanks, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Remembering now his work of redemption and offering to you this sacrifice of thanksgiving,

We celebrate Christ's death and resurrection as we await the day of his coming.

Therefore, O God, we who have been redeemed by Jesus Christ, and made a new people by water and the Spirit, now bring before you these gifts. Receiving Communion

All are welcome to receive Holy Communion at St. Mary's. You may receive bread only or both bread and wine. As you come forward, please hold your hands out to receive bread. (There are gluten-free wafers available upon request.) To receive the wine, please help to guide the chalice to your lips. **We do not observe the practice of dipping the bread into the cup.** If you prefer not to receive communion, but desire a blessing instead, please cross your arms over your chest as you come forward, and the clergy will pray with you.

Verses 1-3, 5, & 7

The Postcommunion Prayer All stand, as able, with the Presider

Presider: Let us pray. Loving God,

Assembly: we give you thanks

for restoring us in your image and nourishing us with spiritual food

in the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood.

Now send us forth

a people, forgiven, healed, renewed;

that we may proclaim your love to the world

and continue in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen.

During the season of Lent, the Presider prays a Solemn Prayer over the Assembly.

Presider: Look with compassion, O Lord, upon this your people; that, rightly observing this holy season, they may learn to know you more fully, and to serve you with a more perfect will; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Dismissal

The Deacon, or the Presider, dismisses the people with these or similar words.

Deacon: Let us bless the Lord. Assembly: **Thanks be to God.**

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*Note on the Creed

In praying the Nicene Creed, as printed in our bulletin from *Enriching our Worship*, we will notice that the words "and the Son" are omitted from the paragraph regarding the procession of the Holy Spirit: "who proceeds from the Father..."

Those three words, "and the Son," are known as the filioque clause. These words were not in the original text of the Creed and were added centuries later. The usage of these words in western rite traditions (Roman Catholic, Anglican) reflects a different perspective on the mysteries of the Trinity than that of the eastern rite traditions (Eastern Orthodox churches).

The addition of these words was offensive to the churches of the east and has historically been a source of conflict and a sore point between those churches and the western rite Christians.

Since that time, the Episcopal Church has joined a wider ecumenical movement, including Anglican churches and the Roman Catholic Church, to consider a return to the original wording of the Creed that did not include those words.

In 1994, the Episcopal Church agreed to remove the words "and the son" from future printings of the Creed and did so in recent expansions of the liturgy.

In addition to this change, there are two other noteworthy features of this version of the Creed. One is the statement that Jesus became "truly human" rather than "made man." This serves to illustrate that it was the humanity of Jesus, rather than his maleness, that is significant to our salvation. The second is the use of the indefinite article ("who") in reference to the Holy Spirit, avoiding unnecessary gendered language for the Spirit.

It is good for us to learn to pray this version of the Creed, at least sometimes, in the spirit of this wide ecumenical movement.
